



COTTRELL RESORT SENIORS SECTION MEMBERS GUIDE



INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the Seniors Section. We are an independent Section formed from members of Cottrell Resort Golf Club who are aged 55 years and above. Our declared aim is to promote the enjoyment of golf and engender good comradeship amongst our members by arranging friendly competitions amongst ourselves, and with other like-minded clubs.

During the year, we organize around 50 competitions each Wednesday morning and friendly home and away team matches with other clubs. The programme consists of a mix of Annual Knock-out Competitions, Monthly Medals, various Stableford Competitions, as well as a number of 'fun' competitions. The competition programme is comprehensive, and the Committee goes to great lengths to ensure it is well organized and administered.

This guide has been assembled primarily for the benefit of new members but is available to all and is presented in a format such that it may be readily updated year on year because the Section and the programme of events are continually evolving. **Please carefully read and take note of Clause 7.2**

SECTION A: - SECTION COMPETITIONS

1.0 COMPETITION RULES & REGULATIONS.

- 1.1 A current World Handicap System (WHS) Handicap Index is a pre-requisite in order to compete in Section competitions.
- 1.2 Members who do not have a Handicap Index may play in Section Competitions to enable them to submit the 54 Hole results required to obtain the requisite Handicap Index but cannot win the main competition prizes.
- 1.3 The minimum number of submitted scorecards for Board or External Competitions in a 12-month period is 10.
- 1.4 Generally, all competitions are played off the Yellow Tees with the exception of the Summer Medals and the 36-hole Stroke Play Competition which are played off the White Tees. Other formats may be used throughout the year as agreed by the Committee.
- 1.5 Only Members who have paid their Club Membership fees, by the due date, are eligible to enter competitions.
- 1.6 Under the R&A Rules of Golf 'the Committee that runs the golf competition must be identified and only the members of that Committee have the authority to make decisions in relation to competitions.'
- 1.7 Buggies may be used for all Section competitions where conditions allow their use. Buggy drivers must use the defined paths where available and in particular around all Tees and Greens.

2.0 PROCEDURES FOR ENTERING COMPETITIONS.

2.1 The process for registering for a competition is as follows:

- Log into the Cottrell Resort Website <https://cottrellpark.com> or the Elite Live App on your phone,
- Select 'Golf Courses and Membership' or 'Make a Booking' on the App.
- Select 'Book Golf as a Member'.
- Log into the Online Booking System (username and password can be obtained from Reception staff at Cottrell Resort if you do not have one).
- Select 'Make a Booking'.
- Select 'Golf Competitions' on the bookings screen.
- Select the Competition you wish to enter, highlighted in green.
- If you would like to book more than one person onto the tee time, select number of participants from the drop down.
- Select the members name or enter membership number if known.

PLEASE NOTE: IF YOU CANNOT FIND THE MEMBERS NAME IN THE DROP DOWN, IT MEANS EITHER THEY HAVE EITHER NOT REGISTERED ONLINE AS YET OR THEY HAVE NOT TICKED THE BOXES TO SHOW OTHER USERS THEY ARE ON THE SYSTEM.

- Press Submit
 - You must then 'Complete Purchase'.
 - Then allocate your time slot by selecting the time and pressing 'allocate or allocate all above names'.
- PLEASE NOTE: THE SYSTEM WILL ALLOW YOU TO BOOK AN AGREED NUMBER OF PEOPLE INTO EACH START SLOT UNTIL ALL THE TIME SLOTS ARE FILLED. IF THE TIME SLOTS ARE FULL WHEN YOU COME TO BOOK, PLEASE CONTACT RECEPTION AT COTTRELL PARK WHO MAY BE ABLE TO HELP.**
- If you return to the Golf Competitions screen and select the competition you entered you will then be able to view the comp sheet online to see the bookings.
 - As always if you are having problems the team at Cottrell Resort are available to assist by phone during office hours.

2.2 If you find that you are unable to play, on or before the day, it is your responsibility as well as good manners and etiquette to inform the Competition Secretary, your playing partners and also delete your name from the Start Sheet. Others may then be able to take your place and it gives your partner(s) a chance to reorganize, or join another group if left on their own.

2.3 On the day of the Competition, please register with reception, collect a scorecard and announce your presence to your playing partners. The Committee requests that you include your name, the competition, the date and your tee time. **Note that according to the January 2023 update of the Rules of golf, it is no longer a requirement to include your handicap index on the scorecard.** Write your name, competition date, tee time, on a brown envelope found on top of the Seniors competition box in the changing room, insert your Entry Fee and drop the envelope into the **Seniors** Competition box in the Changing Room

3.0 COMPLETED SCORE CARDS & ENTERING RESULTS ON COMPUTER

3.1 Only the gross score for each hole is required to be entered on the scorecard, though it is quite acceptable to add the net score and Stableford points if appropriate.

3.2 Upon completion of your round, you should check your card carefully and countersign it with your marker; failure to do so will result in disqualification. Then, to enter your score either:

- On the computer in the shop using the touchscreen. If you have difficulty in entering your score, please seek help from your playing partner or any other Member in the vicinity of the changing room or,
- Via the '**HowDidIdo**' App if you are registered with them.

- 3.3 Place your completed and signed scorecard in the Seniors Competition Box in the changing room. Should the computer be out of action, just place your scorecard in the box.
- 3.4 Competition results, together with the list of prize winners, will be e-mailed to all those members who have elected to be kept informed via the Section Communications Preferences List and will also be posted on the Seniors Notice Board within 48 hours of the Competition. Competition results are also posted on the '**HowDidIDo**' website where those Members who have signed up to the service will electronically be notified of the Competition results. Additionally, Competition results are also published in the Seniors Section of the Members Corner on the Resort website. The Competition Secretary will be pleased to assist Members not registered with '**HowDidIDo**' to access the sites.

4.0 RETURN OF SCORECARDS

- 4.1 Members are reminded once they have entered a **Qualifying Competition** as defined under the Rules of Golf and the WHS Handicapping System, **you must return a scorecard.**
- 4.2 Failure to return a scorecard after entering a competition will result in a Nil Return (NR). If the score can be discovered from the Marker's scorecard it can still be entered. The player's handicap will be adjusted accordingly and they will also be disqualified from the competition.
- 4.3 Some Members are under the false impression that their handicap will remain unaffected if they do not return a card on completion of their round. This is incorrect and strictly against the Rules of Golf.

5.0 ENTRY FEES & ALLOCATION OF PRIZE MONIES

- 5.1 The entry fee for each Competition is currently £3.00, however, this is subject to change as and when the Committee need to review. The Entry Fee includes £1.00 for automatic entry into the Ball Sweep when this is appropriate. The proceeds of the Ball Sweep are paid out in total in each Competition and are divided equally between those participants who recorded a 2 or better on the day. In the event that there are no 2's, the proceeds of the Sweep are paid into Section funds. Any 'Holes-in-One' and 'Eagles' are exceptionally rewarded! The remaining fee is allocated on a ratio of 75% /25% between prize money and Section funds. The prize fund monies for our regular competitions will be split evenly between the number of divisions set up in the competition and then allocated individually within the division, dependent on the number of competitors in that division. The Competition Secretary maintains a spreadsheet for the allocation of winnings. Weekly Winners Sheets are published in the Seniors Section of the Resort website and on the Section Notice Board. All proceeds from the Captain's Charity Trophy competition will go to the Captain's selected Charity.

5.2 Nine Hole Competitions:

During 2014/2015 the Section was instrumental in having the first 9 holes of the Mackintosh course rated by the Golf Union of Wales (GUW) as a Measured 9 Hole Course. Following the introduction of the World Handicap System the front or back 9 holes of either course can now be used for a 9-Hole competition. This has been designated as such within the Club V1 Software that is used to process competitions and control the Handicaps of our Members. For those Section Members who feel they are unable to regularly complete a full 18-hole round the Committee may introduce a formal 9-Hole Competition that will run concurrently within the customary Wednesday competition. This will encourage and enable Members to remain involved in the Section events on a weekly basis and also maintain a current Handicap Index within the accepted Rules of the WHS. It should be noted that all formal 9 Hole competitions are automatically rated as 'Qualifying' under the terms of the WHS.

Entries into the 9 Hole Competition are made via the usual Entry Sheets or online booking as per para 2.1 (if available). Players cannot enter the 18-hole competition, then give up and consider themselves as entered for

the 9-hole competition. These are two discrete and separate competitions administered under the Rules of Golf and the WHS.

The 9 Hole Entry Fee is £1.00 plus £0.50 for Entry into the 9 Hole Two's competition.

Prizes: There will be two if there are 12 or more Entrants, One prize for fewer than 12 Entries.

6.0 VALID & INVALID COMPETITIONS

6.1 Individual Competitions

Provided there are 12 or more entries and 12 completed 18-hole score cards in the competition box, the competition will be declared valid. There will be no refunds for incomplete rounds and the prize money will be apportioned accordingly. If there are fewer than 12 entries in the competition box or insufficient completed score cards, then the competition will be declared invalid and those that have entered will have their entry fees credited towards future competitions.

6.2 Team Competitions

Provided there are 6 or more entries and 6 completed 18-hole score cards in the competition box, the competition will be declared valid. There will be no refunds for incomplete rounds and the prize money will be apportioned accordingly. If there are fewer than 6 entries in the competition box or insufficient completed score cards, then the competition will be declared invalid and the entry fees of those that have entered will be credited towards future competitions.

6.3 If a competition is either cancelled or abandoned, then those who have paid the entry fee will have their fee credited towards future Competitions.

7.0 HANDICAPS & HANDICAP REVISIONS

7.1 To obtain a Handicap Index a member is required to return 54 Hole scores in either Qualifying Competitions or Supplementary Scores. The Handicap Secretary will assist Members as required with a further explanation as to what is required in any particular case to obtain a Handicap Index.

7.2 In accordance with the R&A Rules of Handicapping, a player is expected to:

- Act with integrity by following the Rules of Handicapping and to refrain from using, or circumventing, the Rules of Handicapping for the purpose of gaining an unfair advantage.
- Attempt to make the best score possible at each hole.
- Submit acceptable scores for handicap purposes as soon as possible after the round is completed and before midnight local time.
- Submit acceptable scores to provide reasonable evidence of their demonstrated ability.
- Play by the Rules of Golf.
- Certify the scores of fellow players.

7.3 The Club V1 Software and the 'HowDidIDo' App are utilized to enter and keep records of playing results. Automatic adjustments to a member's handicap will be actioned via the Wales Golf WHS whenever Qualifying Competition or Supplementary scores are processed.

7.4 **Handicap Revisions.** The Handicap Committee will conduct a review of a player's Handicap Index using the procedures set out in the R&A Rules of Handicapping, Appendix D.

7.5 It should be noted that the majority of Members, particularly those who routinely take part in our competitions will have returned a reasonable number of Qualifying Scores throughout the year and as such will probably have had any appropriate handicap alterations applied via the Club V1 Software on a daily basis.

8.0 LIST & DESCRIPTION OF ANNUAL COMPETITIONS:

8.1 Summer Eclectic Competition:

This Competition consists of a series of Individual Stableford Competitions as determined by the Committee. Each weekly Eclectic Competition is a Stableford Competition in its own right, with individual winners and prizes as normal. The overall aim is to record the lowest score on each hole over the duration of the Competition and hence the lowest aggregate score. At the end of the series, prizes are awarded for both the best Gross Score and the best Net Score. Historically, the Summer Eclectic is played on the Button.

8.2 Winter League:

The Winter League will consist of **a maximum of** 10 rounds. All Winter League competitions will be played as individual Stableford using both the Button and the Mackintosh courses.

Scoring:

Division results will be used for the allocation of prize money and overall competition results will be used for the allocation of league points. League points will be awarded for overall position from 20 points for 1st place down to one point for 20th, the winner will be the player who accrues the most points for all qualifying rounds played. The Competition fee is £3, individual prizes as per normal Wednesday. There will be 2 overall final placings: Winner and Runner up. A trophy will be awarded to the winner.

8.3 **Summer Medals:** Played throughout the Summer, April through to October. Played from the white tees and alternates between the Mackintosh and Button courses.

8.4 **Singles Knock Out:** 18 Hole Match Play played on the Mackintosh course off the yellow tees with full Handicap Allowance. The Section's 10 Card rule applies as a condition of entry.

8.5 **Pairs Knock Out:** 18 Hole 4-ball, better ball Match Play played on the Mackintosh course off the yellow tees. The Playing Handicap for each participant is calculated using a handicap allowance of 90% of their Course Handicap. Players then receive a stroke allowance relative to the player with the lowest Playing Handicap who plays off zero strokes. The Section's 10 Card rule applies as a condition of entry.

8.6 **36 Hole Stroke Play:** Lowest aggregate score over 36 holes played on consecutive Wednesdays alternatively on both the Mackintosh and Button courses. The Section's 10 Card rule applies.

8.7 **Memorial Rose Bowl:** Individual Stableford competition held in memory of Members who have passed away; the results of which also count towards the Stableford Golfer of The Year. The Section's 10 Card rule applies as a condition of entry.

8.8 **Dyffryn Sprint:** Individual Stableford competition; the results of which also count towards the Stableford Golfer of The Year. The Section's 10 Card rule applies as a condition of entry.

8.9 **Seniors Section Open Day:** Two separate Individual Stableford competitions open to both visitors and Members; segregated discrete age groups who play on either the Mackintosh or the Button. The course for each age group alternates each year.

8.10 **Trehill Trophy:** Individual Stableford Competition open to any member of the Club aged 55 years and above on the day of Competition. The Section's 10 Card rule applies as a condition of entry.

8.11 **Captain's Day Shield:** Individual Stableford contest, traditionally a shotgun-start followed by lunch. The Section's 10 Card rule applies as a condition of entry.

- 8.12 **Captain's Charity Trophy:** This is an annual charity event where all proceeds are donated to the Captain's selected Charity for the year. One of the regular weekly Individual Stableford Competitions is designated for the event. There are no prizes awarded on the day.
- 8.13 **All Competitions:** The rules and regulations of each competition will be posted on the Notice Board at the time of entry.

9.0 LIST OF TROPHIES & AWARDS FOR SPECIFIC COMPETITIONS

9.1 The following Seniors Board Competitions are presented at the main Club Presentation Day:

- **Golfer of the Year:** This is awarded to the player who has accrued the most Place Points in all Competitions throughout the Playing Season. Points are awarded to place finishers in the relevant competitions, based on the overall points score in the competition.
- **Stableford Golfer of The Year (SGOTY):** The SGOTY trophy is awarded to the player who accrued the most points from the designated qualifying competitions.
- **Trehill Trophy.**
- **Singles Knock Out.**
- **Pairs Knock Out.**
- **36 Hole Stroke Play.**
- **Memorial Rose Bowl.**
- **Dyffryn Sprint.**
- **Captain's Day Shield.**

9.2 The following Seniors Competition Trophies are presented at the Seniors Presentation Christmas Lunch:

- **Singles Knock Out Plate Competition** (For those eliminated in the First Round (Depends on No. of Entrants).
- **Open Day (Prize for both Age groups).**
- **Captain's Charity Trophy.**
- **Annual Summer Tour.**
- **Captain's Away Days.**
- **Past Captain's Trophy.**
- **Auchterlonie Putter:** Awarded to the player with the highest aggregate score achieved in the Monthly Medals. In each Medal Competition, 20 points is awarded to the winner, down to one point awarded to the player placed 20th.
- **Golden Egg:** Restricted to Members 70 years and above on the first round of the Summer Eclectics and is awarded to the player with the best net score achieved over the duration of the Summer Eclectics.
- **Summer Eclectic: Gross.**
- **Summer Eclectic: Nett.**
- **Winter League.**
- **Most Improved Player of The Year:** Awarded to the player with the largest handicap reduction in the previous 12 months.

10.0 SECTION FUNCTIONS

10.1 Throughout the year the Section organizes a number of functions for its members some of which are subsidized from Section Funds. In order to have access to the reduced prices at subsidized functions, members must have played in a minimum of 10 Section Competitions during the year which can be a combination of Wednesday Competitions, Matches, Away Days or the Summer Tour. Members who do not meet this requirement can still attend but will be charged at full cost. The Committee may decide to waive this requirement and subsidise an event for all participants, depending on the availability of Section funds. In exceptional circumstances (illness, etc.) the Captain has the right to waive this requirement for individuals, but the waiver must be agreed prior to the function.

SECTION B: - TEAM MATCHES & OTHER EVENTS

1.0 INTER CLUB TEAM MATCHES

- 1.1 Inter Club Team Matches are played between March and September against other clubs on the conventional Home and Away basis. Matches are played in Team Match Play format with 8 pairs in each team. The Playing Handicap for each participant is calculated using a handicap allowance of 90% of their Course Handicap. Players then receive a stroke allowance relative to the player with the lowest Playing Handicap who plays off zero strokes. Matches are played as “friendlies” and visitors always have the ‘honour’ on the first tee. The fixture list is printed in the Handbook issued at the beginning of each year.
- 1.2 All Members with a current WHS Handicap Index are encouraged to participate in team matches as it is Senior’s policy to offer every Member the opportunity to play irrespective of handicap. During the course of the season everyone will get selected, but not necessarily on the first time of applying. Whenever possible, high and low handicappers are paired together to ensure a measure of balance in team selection.
- 1.3 The Match Secretary will post an Entry Sheet for the next match on the Seniors Notice Board, and will notify all Section members of the next planned Match via e-mail, 4 **weeks** before the match is due to take place. Members wishing to play in the match should add their name to the list on the Notice Board or contact the Match Secretary as soon as possible via e-mail or phone if they wish to participate in the notified match. The selected team, including reserves will be posted on the Seniors Notice Board and be notified by email approximately 7 days before the match. The selected players are asked to acknowledge receipt of the Team Selection e-mail so that we avoid ‘no shows’. Members not on email will be notified personally by telephone.
- 1.4 If, following selection, you find you are unable play or remain as a reserve you should immediately contact the Match Secretary, who will arrange for your replacement from the list of available reserves. Reserves are requested to be available up until match day, to cover for the unexpected, which seems to crop up with alarming frequency.
- 1.5 On match day, please arrive at the venue at least 30 minutes before the first tee time and report to the Captain, and then seek out your playing partner. If possible, please wear Senior’s kit.
- 1.6 The after-match dress code is smart casual. Once changed, please inform the captain’s playing partner of your match result, they will also collect the match fee, which covers the cost of the post-match meal. Please be aware that if you cannot stay for the meal, **you must notify the Captain 24hrs before the match**; if you fail to comply you will still have to pay the match fee as the club will have already prepared the food and will invoice the Section for it. It is customary for the hosts to buy drinks for the visiting team.
- 1.7 The post-match meal cost is set by the Resort annually and is currently £12.00 for ‘Home’ fixtures, the Match Fee for ‘Away’ Fixtures is set by the home team and will be notified to the selected players via the Team Selection e-mail. The modest match fee enables our members to enjoy a good meal Home or Away and play on some superb courses throughout South Wales.

2.0 SENIORS CLOTHING

- 2.1 Orders for the purchase of clothing are posted periodically on the Seniors Notice Board during Spring and Summer. The list below shows available items and current prices are displayed on the Notice Board:

Long sleeved jumper.

Sleeveless jumper.
Polo Shirt.
Cap-one size fits all.
Ties –stock item.

All articles of clothing come in the usual S/M/L/XL range of sizes and are embroidered with the Cottrell Resort Seniors Golf Logo.

3.0 ANNUAL SUMMER TOUR

3.1 The Annual Summer Tour takes place over 3 days, usually during July or August, at a venue chosen by the captain. The usual format is 3 rounds of individual Stableford competitions, with prizes for each round and an overall winner for the best combined score achieved over the 3 rounds. Handicaps of daily winners may be “adjusted” at the discretion of the captain! In addition, various ‘fun’ competitions are incorporated during each round with much sought-after prizes, including some “booby” prizes. Venues are chosen to be within 3 hours travelling time to allow for one round early afternoon on the first day, a more leisurely round on the second day, with a morning start on the third day, aiming for a mid-afternoon departure after the final prize giving.

3.2 Details of the proposed Tour are normally posted on the Notice Board in January.

4.0 CAPTAIN’S AWAY DAY

4.1 The Captain usually arranges two Away Days at clubs closer to home; the first in April or May and the second in September. The format is the captain’s prerogative with the usual list of individual prizes for ‘two’s’, the longest drive, and nearest the pin; the competitions are non-qualifying. The cost of the day usually includes coffee and bacon roll on arrival, one round of golf, followed by a meal and prize giving.

5.0 SENIOR CAPTAIN’S DAY

5.1 This is the captain’s ‘special day’ at Cottrell Resort which normally takes place in August as the fixture list allows. Whilst the format of the Competition is the captain’s prerogative, it is normally a shotgun start at 9.00 am, followed by lunch and prize giving. Prizes are awarded for 3 places, plus nearest the pin, the longest drive and ‘two’s’.

6.0 CLUB CAPTAIN’S DAY

6.1 Also taking place on a Saturday in August each year is the Club Captain’s Day. The event is open to all Resort golf members and is usually played as a ‘Shotgun’ competition. The Section Captains ‘man’ the halfway-house and add a twist to the day.

7.0 FRIENDLY MATCHES VERSUS THE LADIES & IN TEAMS WITH THE LADIES

7.1 **Annual Charity Shield.** This takes place at a mutually convenient date in May or June as our respective fixtures allow. There is no set format, although in recent years the match has been between teams of 16 players. The proceeds of the event are divided equally between the respective Captain’s chosen charities.

7.2 **Social Matches:** Other matches are mixed team social events where the aim is to make it “inclusive” according to a format agreed by the respective Captains; followed by an informal lunch and prize giving.

SECTION C: - MISCELLANEOUS

1.0 INSURANCE

- 1.1 All members are actively encouraged to take out their own personal golf insurance to cover liabilities that may arise while playing golf.

2.0 DISCIPLINARY AND GRIEVANCE MATTERS

- 2.1 Disciplinary and Grievance procedures are laid out in the Cottrell Resort Members Association (CRMA) Constitution and Rules, Section 9 and Appendix N; these procedures are followed in all circumstances. A Disciplinary Flow Chart can be found at Appendix 1 of the Seniors Section Rules, but in general:
- 2.1.1** Any complaints relating to Rules of Golf or WHS in a Competition, will be dealt with by the organising Section.
- 2.1.2** Any complaints outside of Competitions must be referred to the Club Committee.

3.0 APPEAL PROCEDURES

- 3.1 The Disciplinary and Grievance Appeal Procedures are laid down in the CRMA Constitution and Rules Appendix N, Part 13 and must be followed in all circumstances.

4.0 SENIORS SECTION ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

- 4.1 **Annual General Meeting (AGM):** The AGM is held in March of each year.
- 4.2 **Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM):** An EGM may be called either by the Committee or by written request to the Section Secretary by 25% of the subscribing membership who are to state the specific reason for calling the meeting. This shall be the only agenda item.
- 4.3 Further information on the conduct of meetings are set out in the Rules of the Section which are a separate document.

5.0 SECTION HANDBOOK

An electronic copy of the Section Handbook is made available to every current Member of the Section. The Handbook contains details of the telephone numbers of the Captain, other Officers and Members of the Section together with details of all Competitions, Matches and other events for the forthcoming year. The Handbook is distributed annually via e-mail by the Secretary or issued to them when new Members join.
